Routine for Lesson Vocabulary

Introduce Apparently, there is a flaw in the blueprints. *Apparently* means “seemingly, with the appearance of.” Let’s say the word together: *apparently*.

Demonstrate Wet pavement had apparently caused the accident. The thieves had apparently broken a window, since shards of glass covered the floor. Looking up with a frown of annoyance, Vance was apparently angry at the interruption.

Apply If the meat that was on the counter is gone and your dog refuses to eat her supper, what apparently happened?

Display Now I will write the word on the board. Let’s read the word together: *apparently*.

fixtures

Routine for Lesson Vocabulary

Introduce Fixtures such as these help residents get water whenever they need it. Fixtures are things put in place to stay. Let's say the word together: *fixtures*.

Demonstrate The Jones family bought new fixtures for their house. New plumbing fixtures can be expensive. I replaced the bulbs in the light fixtures.

Apply Are statues and memorials fixtures of the community? Why or why not?

Display Now I will write the word on the board. Let's read the word together: *fixtures*.

flimsy

Routine for Lesson Vocabulary

Introduce This box is flimsy. Something flimsy is not strongly made; it is easily torn and broken. Let's say the word together: *flimsy*.

Demonstrate The flimsy curtain ripped when I grabbed it. The cows easily broke through the flimsy fence. The rope bridge looked flimsy, but it was actually quite strong.

Apply Why would it be a bad idea to build a car from flimsy materials?

Display Now I will write the word on the board. Let's read the word together: *flimsy*.

All Together

Routine for Lesson Vocabulary

Introduce This traffic incident was scary for the bicyclist. An incident is something that happens or an event. Let's say the word together: *incident*.

Demonstrate I never told anyone about that embarrassing incident. The incident at the border was reported on the news. Some of the campers had seen a bear, and they told about the incident around the campfire that night.

Apply Is losing a tooth a common incident for a second-grader? Why or why not?

Display Now I will write the word on the board. Let's read the word together: *incident*.

Team Talk

- Talk to your partner about an incident that has been reported in the news recently. Explain why people were interested in the incident.
- Write a crossword puzzle clue for your partner using the word *incident*.
- Ask your partner to tell about a memorable incident from a book that he or she has read. Encourage your partner to describe the details of the incident.





subscribe

Routine for Lesson Vocabulary

Introduce These colleagues all subscribe to the company's new idea. If you subscribe to an idea, you agree to it or give your consent or approval. Let's say the word together: *subscribe*.

Demonstrate Do you subscribe to his theory? Our gym teacher does not subscribe to the idea that dodgeball is a sport. Most people subscribe to the idea that justice should be available for all.

Apply Would most of your classmates subscribe to the idea of going to school twelve months a year? Why or why not?

Display Now I will write the word on the board. Let's read the word together: *subscribe*.

All Together

- I'm going to ask you some questions. Answer "yes" or "no."
If you disagree with what someone is saying, do you subscribe to it?
If you think your family should go to the beach, do you subscribe to the idea?
- I'm going to tell you a sentence. *Many people did not subscribe to the idea that the county should build a wind farm.* What does *subscribe* mean?

Routine for Lesson Vocabulary

Introduce By teaching her granddaughter how to quilt, this woman's handiwork will survive for many years. To survive is to continue to exist, remain, or continue to live after. Let's say the word together: *survive*.

Demonstrate Plants may not survive a flood. Although Michelangelo died in the sixteenth century, his beautiful sculptures survive. Ron hopes that he will survive the test.

Apply What supplies would help you survive a three-day hike in the wilderness?

Display Now I will write the word on the board. Let's read the word together: *survive*.
